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REMINDERS FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL PARENTS

We are certainly well established into the term with our new routines and rhythms!

The school is buzzing and we have settled into our new environments. It is important that we communicate with each other, share information and keep building relationships, which helps to hold and guide the students. For this to work at best we have to make sure that we acknowledge, understand and respect each other and the spaces we enter including the various boundaries.

To support the students and teachers in their learning and teaching environment I would like to remind us of a few basic ground rules:

- Please make sure that your child eats a good breakfast, which sustains him/her through to the morning tea break at 10.30am
- Make sure your child has a packed lunch, drinking bottle, hat etc. for the day
- Please arrive in time to avoid rushing and give time to put bags, hats, etc. into place
- Farewell your child and leave him/her entrusted into the staff's hands; it
 is important that we leave the classrooms and verandas free so that the
 children can get ready to 'line up'
- It is important that we respect the time 'to get ready to go to class' and allow the space to settle in; for this we need to withhold from trying to engage in conversations with teachers and/or assistants as they all need to give their full attention to the class; if you should have an important and urgent message for the teacher please leave a note or write it in the communication book to not interrupt the process of getting ready
- You can also always leave a message at the reception which will be passed on in due time
- If you want to have conversations with other parents please do this away from the learning spaces, best is in the front where the cars are parked, as the classes also use the outside spaces at the beginning as well as during the day
- Please arrange a meeting time with your child's teacher if you wish to have a conversation

The supervision before school starts at 8.00am. Please make sure that you do not drop your child/ren off before that time (unless they are engaged in a learning activity with a teacher), as the duty of care is not provided by the school. If you need to drop your children off earlier, please use our Before School Care service.

In the afternoons school finishes at 2.45pm and the school does not provide supervision of students unless they are signed in with After School Care; so please make sure your children are not playing unsupervised on the school grounds.

It is important that we follow all of the above to support the daily smooth running of the school as best as we can. Thank you very much for your support,

bellyflops, that was by far the best part of camp. Everyone had slipped, slopped and slapped on sunscreen, but still some of us came home redder than tomatoes.




CLASS THREE NEWS

It always amazes me how quickly the children embrace the new routines and lessons of the new year and then suddenly it is nearing the end of Week 6. Time does fly when you are having fun.

Class 3 is another wonderful moment in the development of a child. With the dawning consciousness of the child as an individual we watch the curriculum meet their needs in a rich and meaningful way.

The nine year old child is beginning to see himself as separate from the world. Where previously, the child was at one with the world of plants and animals they now begin to feel that they stand alone. Once they were a part of the beach but now they begin to notice each tiny grain of sand. Where do I come from? Who am I? Are you my parents? These are often questions arising at this stage of development. The Class 3 curriculum meets the child head on by bringing them Genesis and the Fall from Paradise. This is a reflection of what the child is feeling on a soul level and the stories of the Old Testament are used as works of great literature to nourish the child through this crossing.

We sing, we play recorder, we dance on how we dance!!! If you are passing at 9.15am you will hear us in full voice dancing and singing our Hebrew dances with joyous energy.

This is the year of building and farming and Class 3 have drilled holes to make a mast for our rafts. These we sailed on the dam on Tuesday. We have made spinners and flown them throughout the playground and if you look closely you will see our gardening handiwork springing up around our room. We have made and planted a new garden bed at the rear of our room and zinnias are already sprouting. We have planted strawberries, tomatoes, basil, turmeric, tomatoes, mint, parsley and the list goes on and we have gathered rocks to give borders and paths to our gardens. Thank you to Robbie, Paul, Peter and Dave who have supported us in these endeavours.

A delightful surprise on Day One was the arrival of five little chicks, Blackie, Coal, Honey, Brownie and Snowflake. Never have five chicks been so lovingly welcomed by the children and so well-travelled, as parents and families have fostered them each night and weekend until out coop is built.

NATIONAL RIDE 2 SCHOOL DAY - FRIDAY 22 MARCH 2019

Later this month the students, staff and parents of Samford Valley Steiner School are joining more than 3000 schools around the country in encouraging their students to start the day in a more active way. Cycling to school is a great way to start the day. It's better for your health, and by reducing the amount of vehicle travel, it's better for the planet.

Ride2School is; "A nationwide program that enables students to get physically active on their journey to school"

The problem - Over the past 40 years the number of children who are physically active everyday has significantly dropped. In the 1970s, eight out of ten students rode or walked to school but today that number has dropped to just two out of ten.

The solution - Students who ride or walk to school contribute to their minimum physical activity level of 60 minutes per day. They are also more focused and ready to learn compared to those who are driven in a motor vehicle.
