It has been a patient and colourful journey of various transformations of classroom spaces. In 2017, the intake of the school's first extra Prep class (now Marion and Lydia's Class Twos) was housed in a demountable known as the Lillipilli room. This continued in 2018. In January this year, with the commencement of the new EC building, the demountable was relocated to the Primary School and the extra Prep class was in the Sun Blossom room. Now finally we have moved into our true home, one that will house and educate another 30 years of little ones.

Currently one of the two classrooms in the new building is in use and has been named the name the 'Silky Oak' room. Silky oaks are a significant tree to the Samford area. When first settled, Samford Valley was known as the 'Golden Valley' due to the rich, golden hues of the silky oak blossoms. You may notice silky oaks trees are plentiful in our school and the surrounding grounds. This new EC building also has a lovely new staff room for our growing faculty, and, is also proudly the first school building to have composting toilets!

The creativity that has been both poured into bringing the space alive is something we early childhood educators feel privileged to work in; we feel disbelief yet are humbled at this prospect. To date, no adult has been able to enter the rooms and experience the grounds without being moved because it is nothing less than a work of art!

On the first day of term, the children of our new Silky Oak class very easily and busily inhabited the playground - the water creek, the exquisite climbing tree-frame and the spacious inside play space. The parents of this class also need a very special acknowledgement for their ongoing trust and support in their teachers as we moved and transitioned their children, we thank you!

Soon we will have an official opening where the students, staff and wider community can gather to acknowledge and thank all the individuals whose vision and creativity has lovingly shaped this building into form!

May all who play, work and visit in this very special space feel warmly welcomed.

I am pleased to have stepped into the role of Primary School Education Administrator and thank Cristina Rubsamen for her excellent handover. I am looking forward to getting to know as many of you as possible and support students, families and staff.

Thank you to all families who donated food for the Autumn Festival Harvest last term. On the Friday after the festival, Communify came to collect the donations and they were amazed at the wondrous bounty received and were filled with gratitude. The festival was a huge success due to the tradition built up over time, teacher enthusiasm and student energy, as well as to the community for providing lunch and being a wonderful audience. This term will be the Whitsun Festival 10 June and the Winter Festival 20 June. More information will be available later.





Term 2 is a big term for teachers with class meetings, parent/teacher interviews and reports, therefore to assist with this workload, in the Primary faculty we are trialling something new for parent/teacher interviews. They will be held on Tuesday 21st May and Tuesday 11th

June from 2pm until 6.30. Teachers will advise parents what time slots are available so please keep these dates in mind and wait for further communication.

We have welcomed several new families to the school this term and I hope to meet you at the information night this week. Please also mark the following times for the primary assembly this term, Thursday 16 May and Tuesday 4th June – the hall will be open from 8.30 for an 8.45 start.

A key aspect of Steiner education in the primary school is teaching through the imagination, with a rich collage of artistic activities, movement, story and music to ensure that the soul faculties of thinking, feeling and willing are brought in a healthy, balanced way and the curriculum is enhanced so that learning is embedded deeply. In the primary school, feeling predominates over thinking and will. Will is the dominant faculty in the early childhood realm and thinking is the dominant faculty in the high school, which is why primary class teachers bring the curriculum through an artistic lens, to develop each child's feeling life.

The will is still active but 'doing' and playing are no longer the main forms of learning as they were in the Kindergarten. The ability to think in pictures grows stronger and the ability to visualise story content and processes therein is a rich potential of imaginative learning. The feelings are awakened in these stories,

deepening the engagement of the children. It is not until the High School years that the thinking is developed and freed. This leads to the search for truth, the forces of idealism, as well as the logical and abstract thinking that emerges in the adolescent. (SEA document- Education Foundations – Primary Position Paper).

Teachers therefore focus strongly on the imagination and feeling life; story is used to bring about a deep understanding of curriculum content. This is a key factor why Steiner schools do not bring in digital technologies until the high school years, but allow the imagination to be free to develop in a healthy way during the primary years.

This is the verse that teachers endeavour to say each morning before school starts. We do not work alone! This is a very comforting thought when we take on the "awesome" (real meaning) task of teaching at this school. We believe that Children DO come to us from out of the Spiritual world and this guides us in our teaching. At faculty meeting Primary staff are reading and discussing "Advice to Teachers" by Steiner. This week I was reminded that we are not here only to educate the and prepare the children for life. There is a much bigger picture:

It is time to derive what belongs to education from our knowledge of the relationship between humankind and the cosmos. We must imbue all our teaching with a feeling that standing before us is a growing human being, one who continues what took place in the supersensible world before conception and birth. This feeling must permeate us completely. Only when we are truly permeated by this feeling can we teach properly.


So, what are the practicalities at teaching year 2 "properly" remembering where they have come from and where they are going to... I listened to a teacher from another Steiner school across the world and his words really help me to keep all of this in perspective:

He said his "main goals are to make the children feel comfortable, to love being in the classroom, to love themselves, to love me and to love learning." He reminded me that loading their heads with over-intellectualised "stuff" is not the way. So that I could write in my reflective teaching notes as I did early this week- "Lydia what were you thinking!!!" Children soon let you know when you get off the track!

Reverence, veneration, sense of discipleship, love of students, love of teacher, loving authority lays the

foundations essential for all the children in their school journey. Thank you, Joseph Anthony from Philadelphia Waldorf school, for helping to keep me grounded!

Our classroom is alive with joy and happiness and there is a love of learning. We started the year with a Celtic narrative called "The king of Ireland's Son" As well as listening to and recalling and sequencing the events from a fairly complicated story we have sung songs with a Celtic flavour, dramatised Fedelma (heroine) being stolen away by The King of the Land of Mist, painted, drew story



maps, learnt a few Irish phrases, and wrote and illustrated retellings from the story. All the while learning new sounds in our phonics programme.

The next Main Lesson which we completed was a multiplication and pattern lesson. Each day we started with movement activities in the hall. In three groups the class rotated through monkey bar upper strength work, floor work -rolling, cartwheeling, commando crawling, prowling, seal moving, and skipping out - times tables. We also double sculled on our desks while reciting our 4 times table to the tune of Row, Row, Row your boat. Yes, love of learning is alive in our classroom!

The class then engaged in a World Tales Main Lesson under the expert creative guidance of Liz Franklin while I was on long service leave in Tasmania and Victoria. They learned some Maori songs with accompanying stick clapping, retold Maori stories in their Main Lesson books and learned a haka, much to the astonishment of office staff next door- a computer screen rocking jolly old time it was!

This term we are beginning Part 2 of a King of Ireland Son's Main Lesson, completing our beautifully crafted library bags, beginning reading groups, and finally doing some real gardening.

CLASS 9'S MOUNTAINOUS CAMP - BY ETHAN & LANI



It's 5:30am on a Sunday morning and we are at school. I'm pretty sure most of our jolly bunch didn't know what we were doing there so early (and on a Sunday) until we got on the bus and realisation hit ... We were going hiking for 5 days (Yeah).

On arrival at our destination, we leap out of the bus and grab our packs, wow they're heavy and we'll be carrying them everywhere. Fortunately, we started with a steep hill ...! What a great way to kick off a hiking camp, only another 16km of this (hills). When we finally reach camp, it was almost dark, we were all absolutely shattered, but proud at what we'd achieved.

Getting motivated the next day was tough, it took us 4 hours to get out of camp. On a good day it takes 2.5 hours.

The first day's terrain carried through into the second day, with a bonus, we got to do some 'off-track' walking (which was awesome). THE SENSATIONAL PAFA ASSISTS SVSS GARDENING PROGRAMME

As a school we are lucky in that we have considerable water storage in our two dams. The real challenge however is how to get the water out onto the plants all around our expansive school. I will often place a hose on a tap only to find the next day that it has been moved somewhere else!

It gives me great pleasure therefore to announce that last year the Parents and Friends Association made a massive contribution to the Samford Valley Steiner School gardening programme by donating \$3000 towards the purchase of retractable garden hoses. We managed to buy twenty units, as well as some sprinklers, that have been spread throughout the school. This means that during the hot dry spells over summer we will be able to keep the gardens green and cool.

The hoses were installed by Class 9 students who dug the holes, concreted in posts and screwed the units in place. At last, no more wondering who has moved the hose! I look forward to seeing them being used.





While I have you, I better give you a little update on progress in the gardens. As you can see in the photo below the indefatigable class nines helped create a very impressive compost heap behind the PS gardening shed. Now that the school is making use of all of its waste organic material such as lunch scraps and paper hand towels, we are really composting up a storm.

All of this compost is being fed to our garden beds. In the photo below you can see sunflowers, corn, lettuce, cabbage and broad beans. We have also put in our giant garlic which should be ready by the end of the year. The photo also shows our in-ground worm farms which are also helping to keep on top of the organic waste and feed the soil.

OUTSIDE SCHOOL HOURS CARE

Dear Families,

We are very excited to inform you that our service is introducing a revolutionary parent digital Sign in/out system called 'QK Kiosk'. This digital Sign in/out system will save you time signing your child in quickly and conveniently at the touch of a button using your phone number and unique PIN code.

How do I Sign my child in using the Kiosk system?

We will soon have a Kiosk device available for you to Sign your child in with absolute ease!

Signing your child in for the first time:

- 1. Insert your phone number using the kiosk touch screen
- 2. Sign In with PIN code 0000 then set up your own unique PIN and confirm new PIN
- 3. Now your log in details are set
- 4. Next, Sign your child/ren In by selecting the child and select **Drop Off**
- 5. Repeat same process Signing your child Out by selecting **Pick Up**

Benefits of using digital kiosk Sign in/out System

Old paper sign in/out sheets are now a thing of the past, QK Kiosk helps us better manage and record the exact drop off and pick up times for your child to ensure nothing is missed.

In addition to this, you will have the ability to confirm any missed attendances and recorded absences. You will also be able to view and acknowledge any important messages from the service!

In the case of any emergency, the QK Kiosk advantage is that your details are already electronically recorded and can be accessed anywhere, anytime by our staff to ensure your child's safety.

If you have to collect your child for an appointment and return the child the same day, the system has the capability of recording multiple time entries in one day. If the QK Kiosk (touchscreen) doesn't accept your phone number, please double check with the staff that we have your correct phone number recorded on our system. We can quickly update it, then you'll be able to log in.

Can family member or friends to drop off or collect my child?

Yes, if additional family members or friends are recorded in our system as an Emergency Contact and are flagged as 'authorised to collect'. The additional contacts will have their own log in details (phone number & private pin) so they can easily drop off or collect your child when required. We will be starting the new Qik Kids Kiosk system within the next week and we ask for your patience and understanding in the process and learning of this new system. Parent involvement is extremely important to us and we are thrilled to be able to use this wonderful digital Kiosk sign in/out process to make the Sign in/out process a quick and easy process.
