


SCHOOL MASTER PLAN - COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

This time every year our Class 12 students are working on the final stages of completing the written and practical component of their Senior Project and start preparing for the oral presentation component. The Oral presentations will be held on Saturday 26th and Sunday 27th October, times to be confirmed.



ALICE ROONEY

Alice Rooney has been at SVSS since Preschool all the way through to Class 12. Alice is a very caring person and when she is not around you notice her absence; we often have a bleary eyed Alice reporting late to school, mornings are not her friend!

What is your Senior Project about?

My project is about the difference between human and animal eyes in sight.

So looking at difference between fish (underwater) and birds in the sky, the effects of air pressure on birds' eyes and comparing

all of these differences to the human eye. I have a bit of art as my project but it is more research based towards my thesis.

What led you to choose that topic?

I was interested in the work of Fred Hollows, this led me to looking for a topic to do around the eye.

What have found enjoyable about the process?

Other people's interest in this topic

I enjoyed learning about the differences, and I certainly cherish my eyes more as a result of this project as I understand them a bit deeper.

What have you found challenging?

Staying focused on my topic as it is quite broad. Time management, staying motivated, juggling school work and Senior Project work.

To date what have you gained from the process?

I have learnt research skills, a lot about the eye, and its purpose in the human being as well as in the animal world.

Initially when I started this project I was interested in being an optometrist but I am no longer that keen to pursue this area. It is different to what I was expecting it to be.

How would you describe the Senior Project to someone who does not know what it was? An extra project on top of our Class 12 work load that goes for a year, you choose the topic to research.

How are you feeling about the completion of the project?

Feeling excited at the prospect of completion, but a bit sad as it means the end of Class 12, but am happy that the project will be out of the way

What are your plans once you leave school?

Plan on working and looking at doing a Tafe course Certificate III in Baking & Pastry.

Describe in one sentence your experience at Samford Valley Steiner School

It is like a family school, the teachers are willing to help you learn, I like the fact that we have had a focus on many cultures over the 12 years of our education.



CHARLOTTE ASHER

Charlotte Asher came to Samford Valley Steiner School from West Coast Steiner School WA in, 2005 and she joined in with the preschool in term 4. Charlotte usually carries with her a warm smile, a willingness to help if asked and an ability to make sure she meets all of her school tasks.

What is your Senior Project about?

Ethical fashion and how we can change how we purchase, think about and wear fashion.

What led you to choose that topic?

My interest in Op shopping, this then took a bit of a turn and led me to an interest to fashion in general. This interest increased at the start of this year as I was embarking on this project. My question went from how can I sell second hand clothes on line and extended to looking deeper at the ethical issues behind fashion?

What have found enjoyable about the process?

Initially the shopping for clothing items was fun, then I started to become more interested in the process of creating new clothing items from other items e.g. tablecloths. I have enjoyed the creative part of this process, which was a nice surprise to me. When I started this process was not part of my Senior Project.

I have also enjoyed my time at Tafe studying in a Certificate II in Applied Fashion Design and Technology. Attending Tafe has been good, it has been interesting seeing the different layers to what is behind fashion. When I first enrolled in Tafe I was enrolling for the interior design course but somehow ended up in the Applied Fashion course, I decided it was easier to stay in the course – this was the best decision as it has taught me so much about design, drawing and creating patterns, and the fashion industry.

What have you found challenging?

Getting the designs from off the paper into the real creation.

Shaping a 3d garment from a flat piece of paper – the Tafe course has really helped here, but it was still a challenge.

To date what have you gained from the process?

I have gained many skills from my process so far:

- Selling online and what is involved with that, I was more interested in creating items then selling though;
- photography skills;
- Fashion design skills;
- Sewing skills;
- Time management skills as I juggle a full class 12 load, Senior Project load and my Tafe course

How would you describe the Senior Project to someone who does not know what it was?

This is a year-long project, which can be a process of self-discovery, a great way to learn new skills, a really long project, you learn how to be self – motivating and the end result is it all up to you – what you put in is what you get out from it. There is usually motivation to do the process as it is ideally something your passionate about, therefore it is different to the other Class 12 subjects (some of which you may not be so passionate about O)

As part of completing your project you are planning a fashion show at the school – tell us about this.

The fashion show is a culmination of everything I have been working on, the design process through to the clothes that I have created. I will be using class 11 & 12 students as my models, this the only part of my project where I am reliant on other people, it is a little bit nerve racking & exciting, having my creations on display.

How are you feeling about the completion of the project?

Keen to get it over with, also excited – it will all be finished and I can wrap it up and put it away

What are your plans once you leave school?

Planning on doing a bit of travel, over to Europe.

Using what I have done this year, I may try and get an intern somehow and somewhere down the track look at doing more study with fashion. The Cert II was an introduction I may look into doing the Diploma in Applied Fashion Design and Technology.

Describe in one sentence your experience at Samford Valley Steiner School

Wholesome experience, my education feels like it is rounder on the edges compared to some of the other students from other schools I know.



MAISIE WILLIAMS

Introducing Maisie Williams, her journey started at SVSS in 2005, she left after Preschool at the end of 2006 and returned in 2014 after attending other Steiner schools around Australia. We are fortunate to have her completing her education here as she brings beauty and warmth to all of her work.

What is your Senior Project about?

Essentially it is an exploration of photography and editing of photos, photographs of sunrises and sunsets.

The sunrises were taken mainly from Mt Coot-tha & Shorncliffe, sunsets were taken at a variety of places as I had more time to get there (don't need an early start)

All of the work is done using a digital camera and adobe Photoshop.

What led you to choose that topic?

I was looking for an artistic project, and something I had never done. When I thought into what artistic mediums I have had experience in I realised that I have not had much experience with digital media so decided on photography.

What have found enjoyable about the process?

Most of it, all of it in fact has been interesting.

I really enjoyed the photography course I took. To help me with my project I started off doing a 10 - week photography course, looking at different photography styles and editing, I did this from Jan – March, with a lady called Amy Louise <u>http://www.amylouisephoto.com.au/workshops.html</u>

This course helped me to understand what I can do with a camera, understanding the camera and how to work in other ways, other than on the Auto setting. At the end of the course we had a small exhibition.

I enjoyed meeting other people on the course, especially as we are all there with the same interest, photography. I enjoyed the conversations that happened around this interest and being part of a group that are all interested in the same topic.

What have you found challenging?

Keeping myself motivated for the thesis, the practical side was easy as I wanted to do it, I don't necessarily want to write about it 🙂

To date what have you gained from the process?

- Many photography skills such as working with the camera itself, available light, gear (tripods and filters), settings and working around the challenges that come with different locations. I have also gained skills in editing after a lot of practice.
- Learnt to navigate Brisbane and further afield
- Learnt that it is ok to take 50 photos and only have 1 work out

How would you describe the Senior Project to someone who does not know what it was?

It is a chance to explore something that interests you, it is not school work but more like a hobby.

As part of your project you are having an exhibition, when will that be?

The exhibition will be on Friday 7th September from 9 – 5pm in the Library. Everyone is welcome to attend. More information to come. My favourite piece that will be on exhibition is a sunset from Woody point.

How are you feeling about the completion of the project?

Feeling good, I think I have done enough work for it to be a complete project.

I plan on continuing to take photos of landscapes and improving my skills in this area, but it will be for my own interest and not for a project.

What are your plans once you leave school?

I am applying to do Visual Arts at Uni because it's my passion. I'm looking forward to seeing where that takes me.

Describe in one sentence your experience at Samford Valley Steiner School

It has had its ups and downs but now that it is coming to an end I am realising just how much it has shaped me as a person.







INDIGENOUS STORYTELLERS

Last week Year 9 had the pleasure of a visit from Peter Mulcahy and Waiata Telfer, indigenous storytellers who work across the country bringing their wisdom and stories to others. Here is what Harrison Thorne in Year 9 had to say about the visit.

'I was personally very inspired by what Peter and Waiata had taught us.

We were briefly introduced to each other and we went straight into a ceremony of acknowledgement of the land and people of the land. We all went into a circle on the oval and one by one we acknowledged and introduced ourselves to the land by saying Jagera and Turabul (the two indigenous groups around Brisbane) and then where our ancestors originate from and our names. We then went into the centre of the circle and marked three lines across our arms with water and oak tree ash mixed together. Then we would take a feather and then the next person would go. This was followed by two different dances Waiata and Peter taught us. These acts of acknowledge were very interesting for me, and made me notice how much respect is behind these actions. Peter told us about how all the people who have died are still in the earth and how important the land is and this made me see how lucky we all are to be in a country with such knowledge and history.



Later on we all sat down and Waiata told us a story through some stones from Adelaide, which is where she is from. It was a very interesting way of telling a story, as I had never seen anyone tell a story in that way. She mapped out where she would do things with her family and where she lived in her childhood.

Waiata also told us about how she says hello in her community. It was one of the main things I remember. It's a really different action compared to your average hello, but it looks really special in the most positive way. Waiata is definitely one of the most talented people I've met. She is a dancer, a writer she has written plays and she even showed us a rap she wrote. After Waiata's story Peter talked to us for a little bit about his story and his family, he is honestly the funniest person I have ever met. Peter talked to us about how he can see one of his elders who have passed away and other people who have also passed on. I couldn't stop listening it was one of the most fascinating things I have heard.

At our final session, Peter told us a story of an Emu who was self-centred until he lost his feathers, this was when the Emu started to see the big picture and learnt he needed to look after his family.

Peter had some of us act it out, even though it was really fun and Peter made it funny but we could still see the meaning behind it. After this we moved into working on our families histories, Peter told us a bit of his history and it was really interesting to hear from him. We all wrote on a piece of paper


"Blood, Family, Place, Time, Mentors" in these titles we wrote in Blood our heritage and in family we wrote names of our families as far back as we can etc.

Peter taught us how important knowing our families story is and why we should look into our ancestry as much as we can. He also taught us a little on mainly the male roles and what part they play in the Indigenous culture, which was also very interesting to hear as a male. Peter has been the funniest person I have ever met with the ability to tell things with plenty of meaning and seriousness.

In the end there is next to nothing I could say that they haven't talked to us about story telling. And I am very grateful to have met and learned from Waiata and Peter.'

YOU CHOSE A STEINER SCHOOL: WHAT DID YOU THINK YOU WERE SIGNING UP FOR?

Last Wednesday a large circle of parents had the opportunity to explore questions on Steiner Education and hear from John Bloom, past school administrator of the San Francisco Waldorf School and the current Vice-President of Organizational Culture at RSF Social Finance. Below are some combined notes taken by Michael Brydon and Joan Weir.



John opened the evening by posing some questions: "What choices are you making that will serve your child for the future? What are you imagining for your child's future? What really matters to you as parents?" He indicated that the work of a Steiner parent is to listen to your child and to watch your child's learning unfold.

We live in rapidly changing times. Traditionally, mainstream education is viewed as a way to prepare people for work. However in the future many of today's jobs won't be there. So how do we deal with that? Steiner Education starts with the question "What does it mean to be a human being and how can the education develop that?" John went to say that the real work of Steiner education is to work on the challenges children may have, as that is where the transformation happens, compared to just focusing on a child's strengths.

The goal is to give students a moral compass, so that in a world of Post Truth,* (see below) they can make choices based on deep values developed over their schooling life. Also to support children to grow into healthy young adults equipped with skills to make a difference in tackling contemporary challenges. Steiner graduates tend to be highly entrepreneurial and to be of service.

What are the challenges we face?

- The image of Steiner Ed in the broader community
- Potential for an 'us and them' mentality in the Steiner community towards others. (Inside out) Boo Radley effect –without engaging in the local community, negative ideas can flourish about the school i.e. it is cultish or hippy. (Outside In)
- Parents want to understand Steiner Ed better to support their Children at home, and at school.

What are the opportunities? How visible are we in the community?

- To engage with the broader community in meaningful ways. e.g. teaching homeless how to knit their own winter gear.
- Sharing the benefits of Steiner Ed with others
- Parent Education

There was also discussion around, what will children turn out like when they complete High school. John spoke about the social dexterity graduates have; their keen interest in the world and in the other. Several parents commented that they were attracted to the school after meeting Steiner Alumni who were positive, mature and engaging young adults.

It was a very engaging evening and opened up much discussion.

Expressive Mask & Movement Workshop for Actors will be held in Brisbane 11 - 12 August 2018. Working with mask for over twenty years both in Australia and overseas, mask teacher and maker Brenda Monaghan presents her 'Masque Expressif' Australian workshop tour. In her workshops the expressive mask is used as a powerful tool for the actor to discover the potential of their body and its creative expression. The mask like a divine object, unleashes the actor from cognitive limitations, transforming them into authentic and physically articulate characters, far from their own personal experience. Working with the expressive mask gives actors a greater awareness of how a person's circumstances and internal make-up are reflected through the body and its movement.
